Important Information

For your safety

Read this section carefully before using the product to ensure proper and safe operation. Failure to read them carefully may cause severe injury, loss of life/property, or be illegal.

WARNING

Power connection

- Use only the power source marked on the product.
- Do not overload power outlets and extension cords. This can result in the risk of fire or electric shock.
- Completely insert the AC adaptor into the power outlet. Failure to do so may cause electric shock and/or excessive heat resulting in a fire.
- Regularly remove any dust, etc. from the AC adaptor by pulling it from the power outlet, then wiping with a dry cloth. Accumulated dust may cause an insulation defect from moisture, etc. resulting in a fire.
- Unplug the product from power outlets and remove the battery from the phone if it emits smoke, an abnormal smell, or makes an unusual noise. These conditions can cause fire or electric shock. Confirm that smoke has stopped emitting and contact an authorised service centre.
- Unplug from power outlets and never touch the inside of the product if its casing has been broken open.

Installation

- This product is not water-resistant. To prevent the risk of fire or electrical shock, do not expose the product to rain or any type of moisture.
- Keep all accessories and the SIM card out of the reach of children to prevent swallowing.

- This product emits radio waves and may cause interference to other electronic devices.
- Do not allow the AC adaptor to be excessively pulled, bent or placed under heavy objects.
- To prevent serious damage to this product, avoid strong impacts and rough handling.

Battery

- Use only the battery specified.
- Risk of explosion if battery is replaced with an incorrect type. Dispose of used batteries according to the instructions.
- Do not open, puncture, crush, or drop the battery. A damaged battery must not be used. This can result in the risk of fire, explosion, overheating, and leaking of the electrolyte.
- Stop using the battery immediately and keep away from fire if it emits an abnormal smell or leaks electrolyte. Released electrolyte may cause fire or burns.

- Do not allow liquids such as water, or foreign materials such as metal pieces or flammable materials to get into the SIM card slot. This can result in the risk of fire, electric shock, or malfunction.
- Do not leave this product near heat sources (such as radiators, cookers, etc.), in direct sunlight, or in a car under blazing sun. It should not be placed in rooms where the temperature is less than 0 °C or greater than 40 °C.
- You are advised not to use the phone in an aircraft. Turn the phone off before boarding an aircraft. Set the alarm function off so that the phone cannot be automatically turned on. - Do not damage, carelessly handle, or short-circuit the gold-coloured contacts.
 Data might be lost or malfunction may result.



Your wireless device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed radio wave exposure limits recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organisation ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health. These guidelines also form the basis of international regulations and standards on RF Exposure.

The guidelines use a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or

SAR. The SAR limit for wireless devices is 2 W/kg. The highest SAR value for this device tested at the ear was 0.545 W/kg. The highest SAR value for this device tested on the body was 0.525 W/kg.*1

As SAR is measured utilizing the devices highest transmitting power the actual SAR of this unit while operating is typically below that indicated above. This is due to automatic changes to the power level of the device to ensure it only uses the minimum level required to communicate with the network.

The World Health Organization has stated that present scientific information does not indicate the need for any special precautions for the use of wireless devices. They note that if you want to reduce your exposure then you can do so by limiting the length of calls.

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Setting up

Installing the SIM card and the battery

Important:

- Make sure the phone is turned off and the AC adaptor is disconnected before removing the battery.
- Use only the battery specified.
- 1 Open the battery cover.



Position the SIM card as shown below with the gold-coloured contacts facing down and the notched corner turned to the left. Carefully slide the SIM card into the SIM card slot until the tab is positioned on the SIM card edge.



3 Insert the battery, and then close the battery cover.


Removing the SIM card


To remove the SIM card, press the tab and place a finger on the opposite side of the SIM card edge, then gently slide it out.

Battery charging

Charge for about 3 hours. Charging time and battery life might differ when the phone is out of GSM network range.

- When the battery is fully charged, the charge indicator goes off and "Fully charged" is displayed.
- Use only the supplied AC adaptor.

Note when setting up

Note for installing the SIM card and the battery

- When inserting or removing the SIM card, take care not to accidentally touch or scratch the gold-coloured contacts.
- Wipe the battery end (⊕, ⊕) with a dry cloth
- Avoid touching the battery end (⊕, ⊖) or the unit contacts.

Note for battery charging

- Charge the battery in a place with an appropriate ambient temperature ranging from 5 °C to 40 °C.
- The AC adaptor should only be used indoors.
- Do not put any conductive materials such as coins or hairpins onto the charge contacts. This can result in the risk of overheating.
- It is normal for the phone and the AC adaptor to feel warm during charging.
- The AC adaptor should be connected to a vertically oriented or floor-mounted AC outlet. Do not connect the AC adaptor to a ceiling-mounted AC outlet, as the weight of the adaptor may cause it to become disconnected.
- Clean the charge contacts of the phone and charger with a soft and dry cloth once a month. Clean more often if the unit is exposed to grease, dust, or high humidity.





Power off

Press [> ()] for about 2 seconds.

Audible dialling

When you turn this feature on, numbers are announced when pressing dial keys. The default setting is "Normal".

Profile

You can set the silent mode by pressing [#] for about 2 seconds in standby mode.

Key lock

The keypad can be locked to prevent any keys from being accidentally pressed. Slide [?] (right side of the phone) to lock or unlock.

Making calls

- Enter the phone number (40 digits max.).To correct a digit, press [C/☒].
 - Press [] to dial.
- 3 Press [* (b)] to end the call.

Note:

- To insert a pause, press and hold [*\frac{1}{2}*] until "p" is displayed. A 3 second pause is inserted each time "p" is displayed.
- To set the auto redial feature, see page 26.

Using the speakerphone

- 1 Enter the phone number and press (♣).
 - Speak alternately with the other party.
- Press [> 0] to end the call.

Note:

- For best performance, use the speakerphone in a quiet environment.
- To switch back to the receiver, press [♣] or [♠].

Adjusting the receiver or speaker volume

There are 6 volume levels (1 to 6) available. Press [+] or [-] repeatedly while talking.

 When you try to set the receiver volume to level 5 or 6, "Access volume booster mode?" is displayed. Press OK to continue adjusting the volume.

Note:

 Even if you set the receiver volume to level 5 or 6, the volume decreases to level 4 when the phone is turned off.

International call

- 1 Press and hold [0 ±] until the international prefix "+" is displayed.
- 2 Enter the country/region code, area code, and phone number. → []

Emergency call

To make an emergency call, the phone must be within the range of a GSM network.

To make an emergency call:

Enter the emergency number. \rightarrow [\uparrow]

Note:

- When "Limited Service" is displayed (page 32), you may not be able to make an emergency call. Call the international emergency number "112", if your country supports this number.
- If you find that a number does not work on your phone, or for details of emergency numbers, please contact your network operator.

Answering calls

When a call is being received, the ringer indicator flashes

- 1 Press [↑] or [□] to answer a call.
 - You can also answer a call by pressing any dial key from [0] to [9], [X], or [#]. (Any key answer feature: page 26)
 - To reject the call, press [★७].
- 2 Press [* ①] to end the call.

Adjusting the ringer volume

While the phone is ringing for an incoming call:

Press [+] or [-] repeatedly to select the desired volume.

- You cannot adjust the ringer volume while the phone is ringing in silent mode (page 14).
- Programming the volume beforehand:

 - 2 [♣]: "Sound" → **OK**

 - 4 Press [+] or [-] to select the desired volume.

Making/Answering Calls

Temporary ringer off

While the phone is ringing for a call, you can turn the ringer off temporarily by pressing **[C/⊠]**.

Call log

This phone has 4 call log lists. The last 10 incoming, outgoing, and missed calls are stored in each call log (each 40 digits max.). The recent call log list displays the last 30 calls (incoming, outgoing, and missed), beside 3 other types of call log.

Note:

- When a caller's phone number matches a phone number stored in the contacts list, the stored name is displayed and logged.
 - "Unknown Number" is displayed when a call cannot be received displaying a phone number.
 - "Withheld" is displayed when the caller requests not to send a phone number.

Making a call using the call log

- 1 Press [] to display the recent call log list in standby mode.
 - Press [►] or [◄] to select the desired call log lists.
- 2 [♠]: Select the desired phone number. →

Note:

 You can check and reset the duration of incoming, outgoing, and the last call.
 To check the call duration:

Missed calls

If a call is not answered, the phone treats it as a missed call. "Missed Call(s)" and the number of missed calls are shown on the display. You can view the missed call log by pressing **OK** when it is displayed.

Call log options

In the call log list, the following options are available by pressing

- "Use Number": edit and call using the phone number.
- "Detail": view the caller's information.
- "Create Message": write and send text messages (SMS).
- "Add Phonebook": edit and store the phone number to the contacts list.
- "Delete": delete a caller's log.
- "Delete All": delete all caller logs from the selected call log list.

Useful features during a call

Mute

While mute is on, you can hear the other party, but the other party cannot hear you.

- 1 Press [C/⊠] during conversation.
- To return to the conversation, press [C/X] again.

Voice equalizer

This feature clarifies the voice of the person you are talking to, producing a more natural-sounding voice that is easier to hear and understand. The default setting is "Normal".

- 1 Press during conversation.
- 2 (♣): "Equalizer" → OK
- 3 [♣]: Select "Normal", "Treble Boost", Of "Bass Boost". → OK

Note:

 Depending on the condition and quality of network, this feature may amplify existing line noise. If it becomes difficult to hear, turn this feature off.

Network service features during a call

You must first subscribe to the services of your network operator. Please contact your network operator for details and availability of the services in your area.

Hold

This feature allows you to put a call on hold.

- 1 Press during conversation.

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Character entry

- SMS messages saved in the phone are indicated by and those saved in the SIM card are indicated by
- A total of 100 SMS messages at 160 characters (70 characters depending on type) per message can be saved in the phone. The maximum number of SMS message that can be stored to the SIM card is dependent on your SIM card.
- The phone can send or receive SMS messages beyond the character limit for a single message. Longer messages are sent as a series of 2 or more messages. The message length indicator at the top of the screen displays the number of characters remaining and the number of SMS messages required to send.
- Characters that cannot be displayed are shown as "?" instead.

- "Status Report": receive status reports to find out whether your sent SMS messages have been successfully delivered or not.

- "Storage Media": select the memory location of SMS messages from SIM or phone.
- "Memory Status": check the amount of current SMS messages.

Voicemail service

Voicemail is an automatic answering service offered by your network operator. Contact your network operator for details and availability of this service.

- 9 Enter the party's phone number (40 digits max.). → OK → [4]
- From the contacts list:

 - 2 [♣]: "Call" → OK
 - 3 [♣]: "Priority Call" → OK
 - 4 (♣): "Call Number" → OK
 - 5 [♦]: Select the desired position in the call number list. →
 - 6 [♣]: "Add List" → OK

Note:

 Storing public institutions such as the police, rescue services, or fire brigade is not recommended.

Storing an SMS message

When you store an SMS message, the phone sends the SMS message before dialling the priority call number.

Note:

- Make sure the SMS service centre number is stored (page 21).
- 2 [♣]: "Call" → OK
- 3 [♠]: "Priority Call" → OK
- 4 [♣]: "Message" → OK
- 5 Enter a message (70 characters max.; page 19).
 - To change the input mode:
 - \Rightarrow \uparrow : "Input mode" \rightarrow OK \rightarrow (\uparrow): Select the desired input mode (page 19). \rightarrow OK

Turning the buzzer on/off

The default setting is "on".

- 5 ($\ \$]: Select the desired setting. \rightarrow **OK**

Security settings

PIN code

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PIN1/PIN2 protects your SIM card against unauthorised use. PIN1 is used for security to

limit access to the phone. PIN2 is used to control security of certain provided services such as fixed dial (page 23). Both PIN numbers are issued by your network operator.

Important:

- If you enter the incorrect PIN1/PIN2 code 3 times, the SIM card is locked. Enter the 8-digit PUK1 code for PIN1 or the 8-digit PUK2 code for PIN2 to unlock. Both PUK numbers are issued by your network operator.
- If you enter the incorrect PUK1 code 10 times, the SIM card is permanently locked.
 The SIM card will need to be replaced as all information stored will be lost. If you enter the incorrect PUK2 code 10 times, services controlled by PIN2 code cannot be used.
 Contact your network operator for further information.

Setting the PIN1 code request

When you turn this feature on, you must enter PIN1 code each time the phone is turned on. The default setting is followed by the SIM card setting.

- The PIN1 code request cannot be set to "off" with some SIM card types.

- 3 (♣): "Security" → OK
- 4 [♣]: "PIN1 Request" → OK
- **5** (♣): Select the desired setting. → **OK**
- 6 Enter the current PIN1 code (4 to 8 digits). → OK

Phone code

The phone code protects the phone against unauthorised use.

Setting the phone code request

When you turn this feature on, you must enter the phone code each time the phone is turned on or a new SIM card is inserted. The default

setting is "off" and default phone code is "0000".

- 2 [♠]: "more..." → OK
- 3 [♠]: "Security" → OK
- 4 [♣]: "Phone Code Request" → OK
- 5 [♣]: Select "Power On", "New SIM Set", Or "Off". → OK
- 6 Enter the current 4-digit phone code. → **OK**

Clock settings

Alarm

An alarm sounds at the set time (once or weekly) for 30 seconds and is repeated 3 times at 5 minute intervals (snooze function). A total of 3 separate alarm times can be programmed. The phone vibrates at the set time when the silent mode is on (page 14).

- 1 $\blacksquare \rightarrow \bullet \rightarrow \mathsf{OK}$
- 2 (♣): "Alarm" → OK
- **3 (♦)**: Select an alarm (1 to 3). → **OK**
- 4 [♣]: Select the desired alarm option. → OK
 - "Once": Alarm sounds once at the set time. Go to step 6.
 - "Weekly": Alarm sounds weekly at the set time(s).
 - "Off": Turns alarm off.
- 5 [♣]: Select the desired day of the week and press ✓. → OK
- **6** Set the desired time. \rightarrow **OK**
- 7 (♦): Select the desired ringer tone. → OK
 - We recommend selecting a different ringer tone to the one used for calls.

Note:

- Press to stop the alarm completely.
- Press to stop the sound but keep the snooze function activated

- The phone will automatically turn the power on and sound the alarm at the set time even if the phone is off.
 When the alarm sounds:
 - Press and OK to keep the power on after the alarm completely stops.
 - Press and to stop the alarm completely and keep the power off.
 - Press to stop the alarm sound, keeping the power off but snooze function active.
 - Leave the alarm to sound for 30 seconds, after which the snooze function is automatically activated and the power kept off.
- The alarm volume is linked to the ringer volume setting for incoming calls (page 25).
 However, when the ringer volume is set to off, the alarm still sounds at a low level.

Night mode

Night mode is a function that stops the phone from ringing when you do not want to be disturbed. If you set the ring delay, the phone starts ringing after a selected amount of time has passed.

Note:

- If you have set the alarm, the alarm sounds even if the night mode is on.
- Even when the night mode is on, the phone vibrates while the phone is ringing in silent mode (page 14).

 - If you select "No Ringing", the phone never rings during night mode.

Useful Information

Error messages

Display message	Cause/solution
SIM Error	Contact your network operator for further information.
Limited Service	There is no network service in your current location. Move to another location where your network can be received properly.
No Service	There is no network service in your current location. Check the current status and move to a new location with better reception (page 12).
PUK1 Blocked! Or PUK2 Blocked!	You entered incorrect PUK1/PUK2 code 10 times, therefore PUK1/PUK2 code is blocked. Contact your network operator.
Charging stopped, charge within specified temperature range.	Charge the battery in a place with an appropriate ambient temperature ranging from 5 °C to 40 °C.

Troubleshooting

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Battery recharge

Problem	Cause/solution
The phone beeps and/or all flashes.	Battery charge is low. Fully charge the battery (page 9).
I fully charged the battery, but - a still flashes or - the operating time seems to be shorter.	 Clean the battery end (⊕, ⊝) and the charge contacts with a dry cloth and charge again. It is time to replace the battery (page 9).

Making/answering calls

Problem	Cause/solution
Noise is heard, sound cuts in and out.	 You are using the phone in an area with high electrical interference. Move to a location away from sources of interference. The GSM network signal is weak. Check the current status and move to a new location until more bars are visible (page 12).
The phone does not ring.	 The ringer volume is turned off. Adjust ringer volume (page 15). Night mode is on. Turn it off (page 31).
I cannot make a call.	 The phone is not in a GSM network service coverage area. Check the current status and move to a new location until more bars are visible (page 12). Outgoing calls are barred. Deactivate the outgoing call bar settings (page 28). Your call is withheld. Change the show my ID setting to a setting other than "off" (page 26). The key lock is on. Unlock it (page 14). Fixed dialling feature is enabled (page 23). Disable it.
I cannot receive a call.	The phone is not in a GSM network service coverage area. Check the current status and move to a new location until more bars are visible (page 12). Incoming calls are barred. Deactivate the incoming call bar settings (page 28). A call matching the criteria for incoming restriction is being received (page 26). Turn the incoming restriction feature off.

Useful Information

Messages

Problem	Cause/solution
I cannot send text messages (SMS).	 The phone could not connect to the service centre. Confirm that the correct service centre number is stored (page 21). Connection to service centre is temporarily down. Wait and try again later. The destination phone number is incorrect. Enter the correct destination phone number (page 21) and try again. Fixed dialling feature is enabled (page 23). Disable it. Recipient is currently out of network or has turned their power off. Wait and try again later.
I cannot receive text messages (SMS).	Text message (SMS) transmission was interrupted. Wait until the text message (SMS) has been sent before using phone functions.
I cannot receive voicemail message notifications.	When the text message (SMS) memory is full, you may not be able to receive any new voicemail message notifications. Erase unnecessary text messages (SMS) to receive new voicemail message notifications (page 21).
I cannot receive text messages (SMS) even though the phone has enough memory to receive messages.	Some kind of text messages (SMS) can be received to the SIM card only. Check the memory status in the SIM card (page 21) and erase unnecessary text messages (SMS) (page 21).
I cannot receive E-mail messages.	This phone only supports text message (SMS) services. Contact your network operator for details of this service.

Liquid damage

Problem	Cause/solution
Liquid or other form of moisture has entered the phone/charger.	Disconnect the AC adaptor from the phone/charger. Remove the SIM card and battery from the phone and leave to dry for at least 3 days. After the phone/charger are completely dry, insert the SIM card and battery into the phone. Then reconnect the AC adaptor to charge fully before use. If the phone does not work properly, contact your place of purchase or nearest Panasonic service centre.

Caution:

• To avoid permanent damage, do not use a microwave oven to speed up the drying process.
